

The crowd roars—for Yeovil giant-killers



No wonder they all went wild!

SIX hundred and forty-one thousand fans roared their way through the Fourth Round of the F.A. Cup yesterday afternoon.

There were some amazing results: it was a day packed with more surprise reverses and more excitement than any Fourth Round for years—excitement typified in this picture of the crowd mobbing Yeovil's captain after their dramatic win.

Nowhere were there such scenes as the Yeovil supporters watched their

team, giant-killers of 1949, snatch the second goal that won them victory against Sunderland in extra time.

When the referee blew his whistle five minutes before the game was due to end, Yeovil supporters thought that it was over and swarmed on to the field. Police and stewards spent about four minutes clearing the pitch and explaining that the referee had only blown for a free kick to Sunderland.

Greatest crowd of the day gathered at Maine-road to watch Manchester United fight it out with Second

Division Bradford. But most of the 82,000 went home with long faces . . . Manchester, the holders, could only force a draw. Home supporters in the 70,000 at Villa Park had an even more bitter pill to swallow—Cardiff City beat Aston Villa 2—1.

There were more surprises at Grimsby (beaten by Hull City) and at Newport, where the home side held Huddersfield to a draw.
