## YEOVIL TOWN WIN 4-0 IN JERSEY

Yeovil Town F.C. playing the opening game of their Channel Islands tour in Jersey, beat the full Island side at Springfield by 4-0.

### Early Pressure

Yeovil took up the attack from the opening whistle, Bryant going close with two headers which the Jersey goalkeeper saved brilliantly, and soon afterwards he dealt capably with shots from Wright and Stock.

Hamilton, Yeovil's right-winger, was too clever for the Jersey defence and Bryant missed narrowly from one of his centres.

When Jersey raided on the right, Davis cleared well and then Blizzard stopped Le Maistre as the Island centre - forward was breaking through.

Yeovil might have gone in front in the 30th minute, but Wright headed high over with the Jersey 'keeper out of goal. A minute later Wright was put through, but his shot went wide.

The Jerser goal had a remarkable escape in the 35th minute Hamilton, receiving from Stock, put over a perfect centre the ball being deflected just over the bar by an Island defender.

But Yeovil would not be denied, and after a shot from Wright had hit the post a trianguler move between Bryant, Stock, and Coffey, ended with the latter scoring with a shot from close in.

Bryant nearly added another a minute later, Le Riche saving at tull-length

The teams crossed over with Yeovil one-up.

Wright's Goal

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Yeovil immediately attacked when play was resumed, the Jersey goal-keeper making spectacular saves from Bryant and Wright.

After seven minutes Hamilton put over an accurate centre which was neatly converted by Wright, whose shot gave the Jersey goalkeeper no chance.

Occasional Jersey raids were stopped by Yeovil's cast-iron defence. At the other end a Jersey back cleared a shot from off the goal-line and, a moment later. Bryant's first-time effort went only inches wide

Clever Yeovil inter-passing got the Jersey defence in a tangle, but the pressure was relieved for a minute and from a centre by White on the Jersey right, Dyke came out of goal, to punch clear. Drew's head got there first and the ball was trickling into the net when Davis ran back and kicked it off the goal-line—a lucky let-off for, Yeovil.

Ke et on, Yeovil's right-half, injured his ankle in a tackle and left the field for 10 minutes. Jersey were now more danserous, Dyke saving well from Le Maistre and Pamplin. Drew then broke through on the left but was stopped by Hickman. Keeton returned, going on the left wing.

#### **Further Ahead**

After 31 minutes in this half Yeovil went further ahead Hamilton received from Bryant, and the winger, cutting in, beat the Jersey goalkeeper with a hard drive from fully 25 yards.

Then came Dyke's spectacular save from Blizzard's back-pass—a thrill for the Jersey crowd. But play was soon back round the Jersey goal area and Coffey, from the inside-

THE Cup giant-killers treated the 6,000 crowd to a grand exhibition, at times toying with their amateur opponents who rarely got a sight of the Yeovil goal.

Only a superb display by Le Riche in the Jersey goal, plus some fine defensive work by Reg Jones, the Island centre-half, who kept a tight hold on Bryant, stopped the Somerset team from running up an avalanche of goals.
