Mansley & Wright Losers' Best Forwards; Merthyr Well Placed

T is a long time since Yeovil were so well subdued as they were at Chelmsford yesterday, writes our Chelmsford representative. The Chelmsford defenders were masters to such an extent that Yeovil's forwards seldom got within striking range, and goalkeeper Crozier had to deal with not more than a couple of difficult

than a couple of difficult shots.

Chelmsford's strength lay in their intermediate line where centre-half Wicks completely bottled up Phillips, the visiting centre-forward.

Mansley was Yeovil's most progressive and hardest working forward and Wright the best marksman.

Chelmsford were not flattered by their clear cut win, and had they not been so goal-shy in the early stages, would have won even more convincingly.

#### Brilliant McCormack

Their schemer-in-chief was Johnny McCormack, inside-right, who scored two brilliant goals, the first after 38 minutes and the second 15 minutes from time. Plunkett netted the other goal a few minutes after the interval. Yeovil's goalkeeper Dyke made a particularly smart save midway through the first half. He was caught off his balance by a deceptive dropping shot from Plunkett, but recovered in time to stop the ball bouncing over the line. Wright had Yeovil's best scoring chance but his close range header from Hamilton's centre was straight at the goalkeeper.

## Yeovil Drop Vital Points

YEOVIL owed their 3—0 defeat and the loss of two valuable Southern League points at the hands of Chelmsford City last night to the fact that they allowed the home side to take early control of the game and never succeeded in wresting it from them.

Facing wind and driving rain from the start, Yeovil conceded three corners in the first six minutes, and in the first half their forwards were seldom sufficiently constructive to worry a defence which gave little away.

Throughout a hard and fast game Yeovil never really settled down against a side which was fighting as much to maintain Colchester United's lead of the league as they were to revenge their earlier 3—0 defeat at Yeovil. The greasy ball and turf made ball control difficult, and there was a good deal of miskicking, particularly by Yeovil forwards.
