# FOREWORD BY GARY JOHNSON





Hopefully you will enjoy this annual record, with the story of our season. Thanks for your support throughout the season and let's hope the title of next year's book is "Champions" again.





















## AUGUST 2003

Yeovil Town's historic first game as a Football League club kicked off in scorching sun at the Spotland Stadium at Bochdale

It was to be a glorious day for the thousands of Glovers fans who travelled up to Lancashire with Kevin Gall etching himself in the history book with two goals, including the first, and Lee Johnson getting the third in a 3-1 victory.

Within days it was time for the club's debut in the Carling Cup but a 4-1 reverse at Kenleworth Road brought everyone back to earth with a bang.

Yeovil's first Football League match at Huish Park against Carlisle United saw another victory, this time 3-0 with Kevin Gall again weighing in with two goals and one from Kirk Jackson.

So far so good and after two games Yeovil sat proudly at the top of the table.

Next up was a trip to Brisbane Road to face Leyton Orient but a 2-0 reverse saw Yeovil continue to come to terms with League football.


Defeat at home to Northampton Town, 2-0 didn't go down to well and the club had now dropped to 8th. place.

































# SEPTEMBER

The visit of top of the table Swansea saw the biggest gate of the season at Huish Park and nobody was disappointed, except Swansea, as Yeovil ran out 2-0 winners with goals from Adam Stansfield and Kirk Jackson.

Another home game against high flying York was next on the agenda and Chris Brass and his men returned North with no points as Yeovil recorded another victory with goals from Colin Pluck, Kirk Jackson and Adam Stansfield.

The victory took Yeovil back up to 5th. place and they headed North to Belle Vue Doncaster for their next match in great spirits. Even an illness scare involving Lee Johnson could not spoil things as Gavin Williams scored the goal for the boy's third win in a row and a 4th. place in the League.

Not satisfied with three wins on the trot Yeovil's next victims were Mansfield Town where another excellent performance saw them run out winners again by the odd goal scored by Kirk Jackson.

The following Saturday the largest crowd of the season, 7,718, piled into Huish Park for the club's first League local derby with Torquay United.
















## OCTOBER 2003



So another month ends and Yeovil, despite a degree of inconsistency are well placed in the league in 5th place.



















Next game was a visit to the impressive KC Stadium in Hull where The Glovers earned another point in a goal less draw in front of a huge crowd of over 14,000.




Having been 2-0 up and coasting Yeovil staged a magnificent second half rally to draw level but then forgot about defending having at least gained a point.

By now though everything was geared to the big day with Liverpool and with BBC Match of The Day covering the game those poor souls who missed out on tickets would at least be able to see the match on TV.


The air of anticipation was extraodinary and it seemed the whole world was forecasting a Yeovil victory over struggling Gerard Houllier and his men.













The long trip North to bottom club Carlisle should have secured three more points but the Glovers suffered some post F.A.Cup blues as Carlisle beat them 2-0.


The curse of the F.A.Cup was certainly taking it's toll as Leyton Orient completed a double over Yeovil with a 2-1 win.

**GARY JOHNSON has spent** half his life on an epic football journey around Europe that has taken him to Sweden and Latvia via Cambridge and Watford and finally to Yeovil, the Somerset town where FA Cup upsets are almost two a

penny. Throughout his odyssey, Johnson's agile mind has absorbed everything from tactics and techniques to local customs and eating habits. Here, the football nomad talks to IVAN SPECK about his travels and his dreams.

AGICAL mystery tours do not usually end in Yeovil. Gary Johnson's may not either, but deepest, darkest Somerset is where this footballing nomad finds himself — and the town in the middle of nowhere is all the better for his coming.

Johnson's epic journey has taken in Newmarket and Riga. John Beck and Marian Pahars. Liverpool and Gerard Houllier are next, in the FA Cup third round on Sunday.

It is an odyssey that would normally open a mind to the possibilities that exist in football and beyond — except that the mind of the likable Johnson is precisely what allowed this remarkable adventure to begin in the first place. Spend time in the company

Liverpool had struggled to impose themselves during a first half and Yeovil fans were beginning to sense an upset of Herculean proportions until Anfield boss Gerard Houllier announced his first substitution on 50 minutes.
























## **APRIL** 2004



So as Yeovil went into May they were still there but with a strong Hull visiting on the 1st and then an away trip to Lincoln anything could happen.










Sadly though Mansfield could not score again and Northampton secured their position in the Play-Offs whilst Yeovil lost out by a goal difference of four goals.


For the players and thousands of fans who travelled to Lincoln it was heartbreaking but that didn't stop them cheering their idols for minutes after the game.


As the players trudged off all that was left was the knowledge that with a season to learn from this club has every chance of going all the way next year.

It had been a fantanstic season that went right to the last day and the players and manager are to be congratulated on their achievements even if that ultimate goal of promotion had been snatched away at the death.









